







#### Perspective's From A Wheelchair - by Rolf W.

One of the most important things to know about me is that I am a man with many abilities, not a man with a disability. I've lived my life in a wheelchair, and it has provided me with a unique perspective of the world around me. I have often said that there have been many times I've felt as though I'm at the bottom of a flight of stairs, unable to gain access or entry. There were many barriers, physical or otherwise. Yet there were many beautiful and happy times, too.

I was very lucky to have deeply devoted parents, who loved me, fought for me, and raised me to advocate for myself. I was always supported and protected. I don't mind sharing there were also frustrating times that were upsetting for me and my family. For example, there were times in my childhood when my mother asked me to run an errand in our neighborhood and other mothers would tell their children to move away from me, to look away from me. There were also store managers who wouldn't allow me to enter because of my wheelchair. Or this one really upset my father -- and I can still remember him balling his fists in his pockets. One time, my family went out for Chinese food. A person actually complained to management



because I "slurped my soup." According to that person, I shouldn't eat out. My peers and I encountered this sort of behavior, and we continue to encounter people like this. To me, the worst part was my parent's anger and knowing that their hearts were breaking because someone was unkind to me. But they never showed it - they just raised me to be a better man. My parents took wonderful care of me and fought for me every day of my life - and they raised me to use my voice and my gifts to make life better for myself and my peers. My parents are gone, sadly, and I miss them. But I am not alone. I see my siblings and nephews - and thankfully my parents got to see me living my life at UCP. They understood what a special place UCP is. And they knew I would be safe and happy with my UCP family. Today I am a happy man – a man with many abilities. I live in a beautiful UCP home, and spend my days trying to live as independently as possible doing the things I love. I do need assistance but the UCP staff are simply the best. I'm in UCP's Brushstrokes Program, and many of you have seen my paintings and

centerpieces over the years. I've even started making my own adaptive painting tools - I get inspired at Home Depot, my favorite store. Thankfully management there always makes me feel welcome and I'm able to buy whatever I need. I've recently taken up photography, too, and I love it. Anytime I want to try something new, UCP staff supports and encourages me, as do my peers. Most importantly, I use my voice to speak about how important it is to advocate for the disabled. I've seen a lot from this wheelchair over the years, and there is still a need to break down barriers. My peers and I are so grateful that UCP educates our community, helps people with disabilities live independently, find jobs, and even helps people get





married – UCP helps people live their own *Life Without Limits*. However, breaking down barriers is a massive job! Imagine today witnessing that mother and her child shunning my younger self, or that man complaining because of how I ate my soup. In those moments, you might not be able to speak up - it's not easy. But let's be grateful that UCP of Long Island exists. I am everyday.

The Mayor of Patchogue, Mayor Paul V. Pontieri Jr., members of The Patchogue Chamber of Commerce and The Patchogue Arts Council all were on hand to celebrate UCP-LI's *Life Without Limits* mission.

With every stroke of the brush, UCP-LI's artists demonstrate their skills. Each artist embraces his or her unique talent, using adaptive tools when needed & exploring unconventional techniques such as painting with bubble wrap, chopsticks, Brillo, chicken wire, among others.



The end result is always something beautiful & special. The arts build relationships and "open doors" as UCP-LI's artists participate in events throughout the Long Island community where they can sell their work & showcase their many abilities.

UCP of Long Island provides residential care in 31 homes across Suffolk County, serving two




residential homes in the town of Patchogue.


